PRINTING INSTRUCTIONS

PLEASE READ BEFORE YOU PRINT YOUR PATTERN

Hi lovely quilters and crafters,

A few of you are having problems with the templates and/or images in our PDF patterns printing with a black background. Thankfully this is uncommon and is caused by the differences between the various apps, devices, and printers we all use.

All of our patterns are test printed multiple times by a group of reviewers before release. If we find an issue we correct it immediately and update the pattern concerned.

We've found, after an extensive review of the problem, that it happens mostly on Apple devices, especially if you are printing from 'preview' or your browser window.

Regardless of what device you use, 99.9% of black background issues are solved by the following –

1. **Always** save the PDF file to your hard drive.
2. **Always** open the file using a **PDF reader** (eg. Adobe or Foxit) **not** your browser.
3. **Always** print from the PDF reader. **Never** print from your browser window.
4. **Always** print a template test page - use the draft print options to save printer ink if something goes wrong.
5. Printing in **black & white** instead of colour sometimes resolves the problem.

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ONE-INCH GUIDE

- ♦ Measure to ensure the pattern templates print to scale.
- ♦ Ensure your printer is set to 'no scaling' or 'print at 100%' in the print options menu.
- ♦ Look for the option in the print menu that says 'Auto-Centre' and tick this box. This will centre your pattern and will fix any unnecessary cropping of text and templates.

BEFORE THE FUN BEGINS

- ◆ Please read all instructions before you begin.
- ◆ Abbreviations. "WOF" = 'width of the fabric'.
- ◆ **Requirements are based on fabric 115cm (44in) wide unless otherwise stated. Fabric requirements may differ from person to person due to cutting methods. If in doubt it is a good idea to purchase a little extra fabric.**
- ◆ Fusible webbing requirements will vary greatly between products and projects; assume you will need a lot and go from there!
- ◆ 1/4in seam allowances are used throughout unless otherwise stated.
- ◆ Pre-washed 100% cotton fabrics are recommended.
- ◆ Please refer to the photo of the project and the quilt diagrams to help with colour choices and layout.
- ◆ **The templates are reversed for your convenience. I would recommend using an appliqué mat with all but the most simple appliqué shapes.**
- ◆ Our patterns are proof-read and made by our lovely testers but sometimes mistakes do slip by us. Please let us know if you come across an error so we can correct it.
- ◆ This design and its instructions, diagrams, and templates are protected by copyright. They may not be reproduced by any process. The instructions and information contained in this pattern are given in good faith, but no guarantee is given due to the fact we have no control over the techniques and materials used. This pattern is not intended to replace a class.

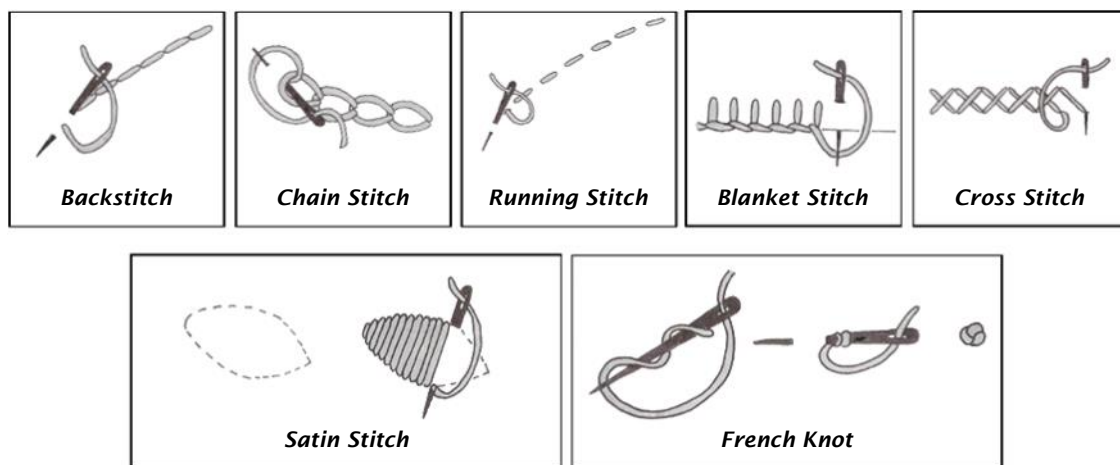
A NOTE ABOUT BUTTONS

- ◆ I like to use buttons on my projects but they aren't suitable for children under three (3) years of age due to them being a choking hazard. Replace buttons with appliqué or embroidery when you are making the project.
- ◆ Safety eyes are available from all good craft stores. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.

IMPORTANT! HOW TO PRINT TEMPLATES FROM PDF PATTERNS

- ◆ All templates are provided at their full size. Ensure your printer is set to print at 100% and deselect the scaling and cropping options. Ensure you deselect the option that says "print to printer margins". Do centre the page.
- ◆ Some templates may be divided into two or more sections and will need to be joined to make the complete template. Simply match the shapes along the dashed or dotted lines as marked on the template, then use adhesive tape to stick them together. Occasionally a shape will distort a tiny bit in the printing process, simply adjust where necessary.

STITCH GUIDE



TINY LITTLE REINDEER

Approx. size 3 1/2in wide x 5in tall (including antlers)

What You Will Need to Make (1) Reindeer

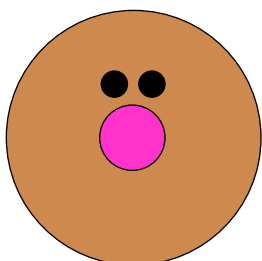
- ◆ 15cm x 25cm (5in x 10in) rectangle of good quality light brown wool felt for the face/head shapes.
- ◆ 20cm (8in) square of good quality contrasting wool felt for the antlers.
- ◆ 15cm (5in) square of wadding (batting).
- ◆ A scrap of pink fabric for the nose.
- ◆ A scrap of green wool felt for the holly leaves.
- ◆ (2) small black buttons for the eyes (*optional*).
- ◆ (3) small red buttons for the holly (*optional*).
- ◆ Scraps of lightweight fusible webbing.
- ◆ Stranded embroidery thread for the facial features.
- ◆ A 25cm (14in) length of thread or twine to hang the ornament.
- ◆ Matching thread to suit your favourite applique stitching method.
- ◆ Tracing paper.
- ◆ A scrap of tinsel (*optional*).
- ◆ General sewing supplies.

How to Make a Reindeer

1. Trace the pattern pieces onto the tracing paper then cut out the pattern pieces on the lines. You will need to trace the following—(1) large circle shape, (1) small circle shape, (1) ear shape, and (1) holly leaf shape.
2. Pin the pattern pieces to the fabrics you have chosen for the project and cut—
 - (2) large circle from the light brown felt,
 - (2) ears from the light brown felt,
 - (1) small circle from the wadding, and
 - (2) holly leaves from the green felt. Set the shapes aside.
3. Use a pencil to trace the required appliqué shapes onto the paper side of the fusible webbing. Leave approx. 1/2in between each shape. You will need to trace—
 - (2) small circles,
 - (1) nose shape, and
 - (4) antler shapes (cut two in reverse).
4. When you have finished tracing the templates, roughly cut out the nose and antler shapes 1/4 **outside** the traced lines. Cut out the (2) small circle shapes **on** the lines. Set the small circle shapes aside.
5. Fuse the nose shape to the wrong side of pink fabric and the (4) antler shapes to the felt you have chosen for the project following the manufacturer's instructions.
Cut the shapes out carefully on the lines when cool to the touch. Set the antlers aside.
6. Use the template and the colour photograph as a guide to fuse the nose shape to the right side of one brown felt face/head shape (large circle).

Stitch around the nose using your favourite method. I stitched around the nose shape using machine blanket stitch and matching thread. Use a light, sharp pencil to draw the mouth on the reindeer, then chain stitch using two strands of contrasting embroidery thread. Sew the buttons to the reindeer's face for eyes using strong thread. Knot securely.

A Note About Buttons

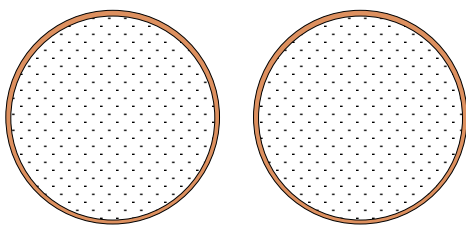
I like to use buttons on my projects but they aren't suitable for children under three (3) years of age due to them being a choking hazard.

7. Centre and fuse the (2) small circles of fusible webbing to the wrong side of the (2) brown felt face/head pieces. Remove the backing paper, then set both pieces aside.

8. Lay out the antlers on your work surface in pairs. Remove the backing paper then carefully fuse them together with the fusible sides facing. Trim any untidy felt edges where necessary, then set aside.

9. Fold an ear shape in half at the notch. Use Diagram 4 as a guide to sew the ears together along the seam created by the notch. Use matching thread and small, neat hand stitches. Repeat to make (2) ears.
I've used dark thread for photo purposes.

10. Place the remaining brown felt circle (back head shape) right side down on your work surface, the fusible webbing facing up. Baste the ears and the antlers to the head shape using contrasting thread and large stitches.

11. Place the back of the reindeer on your work surface again, right side facing down. Fold the hanging thread in half, tie a knot close to the end, then centre it on the top of the reindeer. See Diagram 5.

Place the circle of wadding on top, then press until fused. Be careful not to burn the felt and wadding.

12. Place the front of the reindeer on top of the wadding with the right side facing up. When you're happy with its position, press to fuse it in place. Trim any untidy edges.
13. Stitch around the edges of the reindeer using matching thread, securing the raw edges of the ears, antlers and hanging thread in the seam.

The quickest and easiest way to do this is to use straight stitch on your sewing machine. Sew around the body, and then the antlers two or three times to secure. Carefully remove the basting stitches.

14. Add a tinsel bow or holly leaves for Christmas sparkle and hang them on your tree!
To make the holly, baste (2) leaves together at the base, then secure to the reindeer using matching thread and (3) buttons for berries.

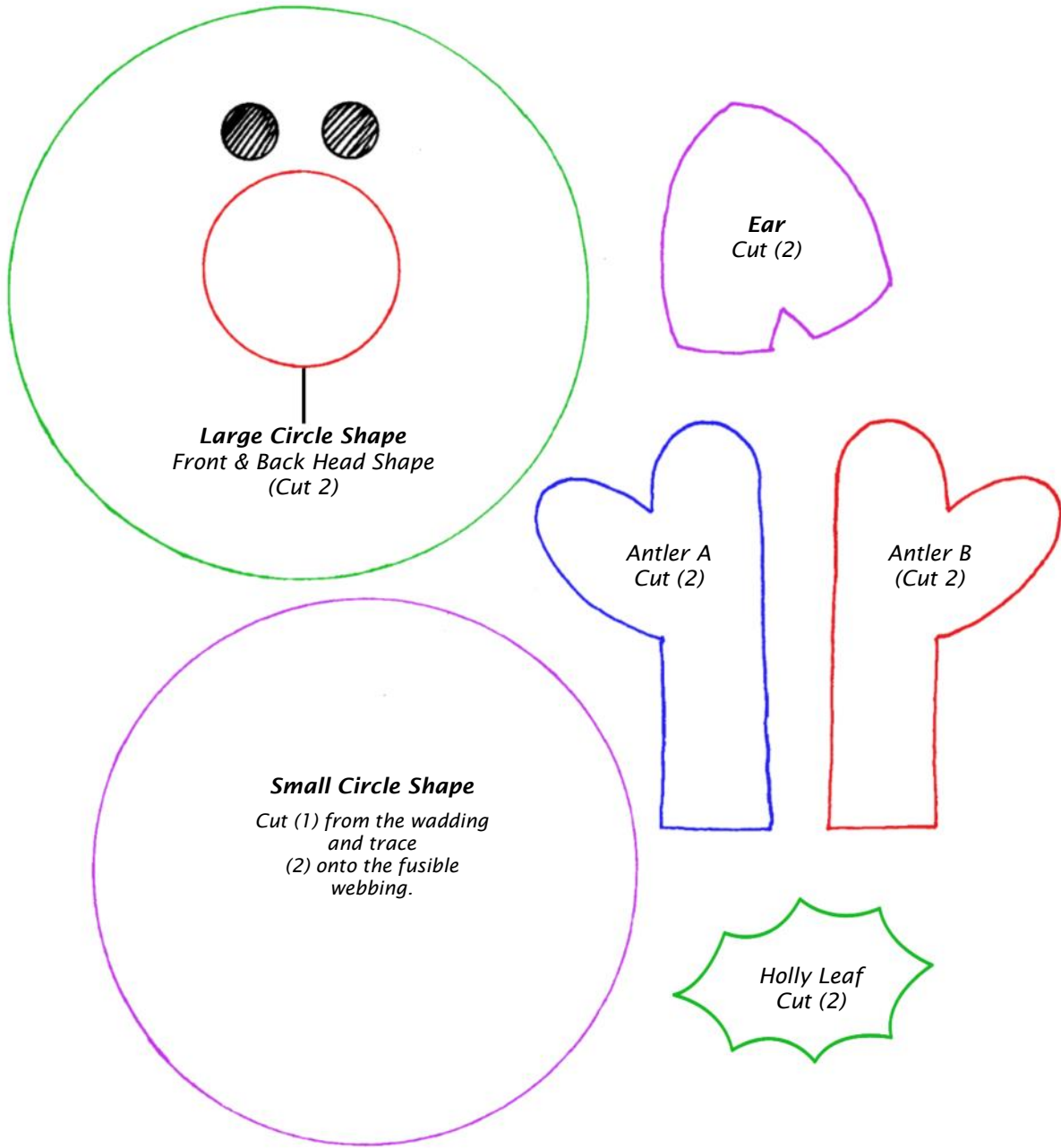
